- (c) Write a detailed note on Wordsworth's treatment and perception of nature on the basis of your reading of *Tintern Abbey*.
- (d) Analyze the portrayal of Jimmy Porter in *Look Back in Anger*.
- (e) Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* "celebrates access to the uncanny and the breakup of all normal rules and social barriers to display human nature in the grips of elemental passions and the subconscious". Give your views.
- (f) Discuss Hemingway's use of symbols and their significance in *A Farewell to Arms*.
- (g) Do you believe that Hemingway's *A Farewell to Arms* shows how war devastates the moments of love as well as sacrifices of soldiers in the battlefield as well as breaks individual trust? Give a reasoned answer.
- (h) Austen depicts Emma as "courageous enough to express her thoughts without minding the way other people may take her". Discuss Emma's character in the light of the quoted statement.
